Whatever your answer, why not keep pace with this grammar table and verb principal part learning scheme, typical of those used by tutors with Advanced (i.e. post-GCSE) groups. The page references in the table above correspond to James Morwood's *Oxford Grammar of Classical Greek* (OUP, 2003); this is a book we lend to all Advanced students. If you aren't able to source a copy, no matter: most Greek textbooks have equivalent grammar sections and lists of very similar verb principal parts, so you can easily construct your own scheme based on these.

You can make your learning of the accidence much more interactive by making use of the Verb, Noun and Adjective Testers of the Eton Greek Project. Just click on 'Set-up' within the relevant tester and select the words or forms that correspond to the tables in Morwood's *Oxford Grammar* that you need to learn on a given day.
